FINDINGS AND CONCLUSION

The application, testimony and evidence comprising the record of this case are hereby included by reference in this decision. Based on the record and in accordance with the provisions of the state Open Meetings Act, the Board authorized the conditional use and variance of the minimum required rear yard, subject to the conditions that the kennel is limited to not more than seven adult dogs, aged one or more years, and installation of sound absorbing materials in at least one of the exterior runs to minimize the sound of dogs and puppies barking. As the kennel will comply with the minimum distance requirements of 200 feet, no variance is necessary. The pertinent findings determining the Board's decision include the facts that the kennel's interior pens will be located in the existing pole building, connecting with the exterior runs near the rear property line, which adjoins open farmland. The applicants propose to breed and raise purebred Doberman pinschers, German shepherds and collies for sale. Each female will be limited to one litter per year. Although individual training of dogs will be conducted on the premises, there will be no commercial boarding or grooming in conjunction with the kennel. As proposed, including sound abatement practices, operation of the kennel will not unduly affect residents of adjoining properties, the values of those properties, or public interests.
